Sep. '03 - Researcher, Arms Transfers Programme, SIPRI

SIPRI is a research institute dealing with questions concerning peace and security. My work focuses on international arms transfers, governmental transparency in the field of arms exports, and the workings of national and multilateral arms control instruments, particularly the EU Code of Conduct on Arms Exports (the EU Code). The core responsibilities of my work include:

- Helping to update the SIPRI Arms Transfers Database, an electronic archive of all international transfers of major conventional weapons from 1950 to the present day, and co-authoring the chapter on international arms transfers in the annual SIPRI Yearbook, the institute's flagship publication.

- Maintaining the Arms Transfers Project website, including developing and maintaining an online archive of all national reports on arms exports and helping to develop a web-based, publicly accessible version, of the SIPRI Arms Transfers Database.

- Speaking at conferences and seminars on issues relating to the Projects work. For example, in July 2005 I addressed a meeting of government and EU officials organised by the UK Foreign Office on the issue of national reporting on arms exports.

I have also been involved in developing and funding a number of research projects in areas related to the project's work. Examples include:

- A 2004 study of the Annual Report on the implementation of the EU Code, funded by the Dutch government. The study involved interviews with government officials from all the EU member states and its findings were presented at a seminar in Brussels in October 2004 attended by EU government officials and representatives of the EU Council Secretariat.

- A two-week consultancy with the South Eastern and Eastern Europe Clearinghouse for the Control of Small Arms (SEESAC) in Belgrade in February 2006, funded by the UNDP. During the consultancy I advised regional governments on how to develop national arms export reports in accordance with EU standards.

- A two-year study of how the implementation of the EU Code has impacted upon the arms export policies of EU member states, funded by the European Foreign and Security Policy Studies Programme (EFSPS). Running from April 2006 to April 2008, the study's output consisted of two academic articles and a Policy Paper.

Jul. '00 - Jul. '02 International Security Policy Analyst, British American Security Information Council (BASIC)

BASIC is a research and advocacy institution with offices in London and Washington. My work focussed on US missile defence plans and nuclear disarmament and involved writing reports, liaising with the press and organising seminars.

Feb. '00 - Jul. '00 Volunteer, Campaign Against Arms Trade (CAAT)

CAAT is a campaign and research group focused on the international arms trade. My work at CAAT included producing briefings on UK arms exports to Saudi Arabia and Colombia.
